Program of All-Inclusive Care for the Elderly (PACE) – Plain-English Overview for Kent County Seniors

1 □ Wha**PACE** Is

PACE is a **single**, **government-funded health-and-social-services program** that gives people who are **65 or older (or younger with certain disabilities)** a **team-based "one-stop shop"** for everything they need to stay healthy and live at home as long as possible.

Think of it as "Medicare + Medicaid + home-care + transportation + activities" rolled into one membership.

2□ Who Can Join (Eligibility)

Requirement What It Means for You

Age 65 + years old or younger adults who qualify for Social Security Disability

Insurance (SSDI).

Residence Must live inside the Kent County PACE service area (the area covered by the

local PACE provider).

Living Usually living in the community (your own house, apartment, or assisted-living

Situation setting). You **cannot be in a nursing home** when you enroll.

You need help with at least two "Activities of Daily Living" (ADLs) such as

Needs Level bathing, dressing, eating, toileting, walking, or managing medications or you

have significant health conditions that put you at high risk of needing institutional

care.

Financial

PACE is **means-tested**. Your income and assets are compared to Medicaid limits. If you're **eligible for Medicaid**, you're automatically eligible for PACE. If you're **not**

Medicaid-eligible, you can still join if your income/assets are below the PACE

"cap" (the exact numbers change each year).

Quick tip: Even if you think you might be "too healthy," a brief assessment by the PACE intake team will tell you whether you meet the "needs" threshold.

3 What Services You Get (All Included)

Category Example Services

Primary & Specialty Doctor visits, specialist appointments, labs, imaging, prescription drugs,

Medical Care dental, vision, hearing.

Home-Based Care

Nurses, physical/occupational therapists, social workers, dietitians, home

health aides—all come to your house.

A local center (often called a PACE Adult Day Health Center) where

Adult Day Center you can spend mornings/afternoons receiving therapy, meals, recreation,

and social interaction.

Transportation Door-to-door rides for medical appointments, the adult-day center,

grocery trips, etc.

Medication
Management
Pill boxes, medication reviews, delivery of prescriptions.

Assistive Devices Walkers, wheelchairs, hospital beds, in-home safety modifications.

One "care manager" (often a nurse or social worker) coordinates

Care Coordination

one care manager (often a noise of social worker) ecceptivities—so you don't have to call multiple offices.

Category Example Services

Respite for Family
Caregivers

Short-term relief services if a family member usually helps you at home.

End-of-Life Planning Advance directives, hospice referrals, palliative-care support.

Bottom line: Once you're enrolled, **you pay one small monthly fee (often \$0)** and the program covers everything else—no separate bills for doctor visits, home health, or transportation.

4 ☐ How It Works – Stepby-Step

1.Contact the Local PACE Provider

•In Kent County the primary provider is <u>Kalamazoo-Valley PACE</u> (or another agency if you live near the county edge). Call their enrollment line, or ask your primary-care doctor to refer you.

2.Initial Screening

•A staff member asks a few basic questions (age, address, health conditions). If you pass the screen, they schedule a **comprehensive assessment** at your home or at the adult-day center.

3. Comprehensive Assessment

- •A multidisciplinary team (doctor, nurse, social worker, therapist) evaluates:
- •Physical health, chronic illnesses, medications
- •Ability to perform ADLs (bathing, dressing, etc.)
- Cognitive status (memory, decision-making)
- Social supports and living environment
- •They determine whether you meet the "needs" criteria.

4. Eligibility Decision

•If you qualify, you receive an **official enrollment packet** with a Member ID card and a description of your benefit package.

5. Care Plan Creation

•Your **care manager** builds a personalized plan: which services you'll get, how often, and who will deliver them.

6.Service Delivery

- •Primary care is provided at the PACE clinic or by affiliated doctors.
- •Home visits are scheduled as needed.
- •Transportation is arranged through the PACE ride-share fleet.
- •Adult-Day Center attendance is optional but highly encouraged for therapy and socialization.

7. Ongoing Review

•Every 6–12 months the team revisits your plan, adjusts services, and re-checks eligibility.

5 Costs & Payment

Cost Element Typical Amount for Kent County Seniors

Monthly Usually **\$0** if you're Medicaid-eligible. If you're not, a modest sliding-scale

Premium amount (often <\$50) based on income.

Generally **none** for doctor visits, hospital stays, or prescription drugs. Some states

Copayments charge a small \$1-\$5 copay for certain services, but Kent County's PACE program

follows the "no-cost" model for most members.

Other Fees No separate billing for transportation, home health, or adult-day center. All

bundled.

Only your regular Medicare Part B premium (about \$170 / month in 2025) and

What You Pay any Medicare Part D prescription-drug premium if you enroll in a drug plan.

These are the same costs you'd have without PACE.

6 How to Enroll (Kent County Specific)

- 1.Call the Kent County PACE enrollment line
- •Phone: 1-800-555-PACE (example; replace with actual number from the provider).
- •Or email: enrollment@kvpace.org.
- 2.Ask for a "PACE Eligibility Screening."
- 3. Gather Required Documents (you'll be asked for these during the assessment):
- •Proof of age (driver's license, birth certificate)
- •Recent **Medicare card** (and Medicaid card if you have one)
- List of current medications
- •Recent lab results or physician notes (if you have them)
- 4. Schedule the Comprehensive Assessment the team will come to your home (or you can meet them at the adult-day center).
- 5.**Decision & Enrollment** If approved, you'll receive a welcome packet, member ID, and a calendar of services.

Pro tip: Bring a trusted family member or friend to the assessment. They can help remember questions and confirm details later.

7□ Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)

/ □ Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)	
Question	Short Answer
Do I have to give up my current doctors?	No. Your PACE primary-care doctor can be a physician you already trust, as long as they're part of the PACE network.
Can I still go to the hospital if I need urgent care?	Absolutely. PACE covers all hospital stays. Your care manager will be notified, and you'll still get the same coverage you'd have with Medicare/Medicaid.
What if I move out of Kent County?	PACE is region-specific . If you move outside the service area, you'll need to transition to the PACE program in your new county (or another senior-care option).
Will I still have to pay for my prescription drugs?	Prescription drugs are covered under Medicare Part D (or the PACE drug benefit). You'll pay whatever premium you already have for Part D; there are usually no extra copays for the meds themselves.
Is there a waiting list?	Some PACE programs have a short waitlist, but most in Kent County have open enrollment because demand is high and funding is available. Apply as soon as you think you qualify.
Can I opt out later if I don't like it?	Yes. You can disenroll at any time, though you'll need to arrange alternate coverage (e.g., traditional Medicare + private insurance).

8 Quick "Cheat Sheet" for Seniors

Call 1-800-555-PACE (or your local provider) today.

Ask "Am I eligible for PACE in Kent County?"

Bring ID, Medicare card, list of meds, any recent doctor notes.
Attend The home assessment – bring a trusted family member.
Review The written care plan; ask the care manager any questions.

Enjoy One-stop health care, transportation, meals, and social activities—mostly at no extra cost.

Bottom Line

- •PACE = One membership that bundles everything you need to stay healthy at home.
- •Eligibility is based on age, residence, and a modest level of care need—not on wealth.
- •Costs are usually \$0 extra; you only keep your regular Medicare premiums.
- •Enrollment is a simple phone call, a home assessment, and then you get a personalized care plan.
